## Commissioner's Resolution No.

A RESOLUTION OF THE PORT OF PORT ANGELES COMMISSION IN SUPPORT OF MAINTAINING SUSTAINABLE TIMBER HARVESTS AND REVENUES FROM DNR STATE TRUST LANDS

WHEREAS, the Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR) manages approximately 2.2 million acres of forested state trust lands for sustainable timber production to generate revenue for schools and other public services through a proven model that dates back to Washington's statehood when the federal government granted lands to provide ongoing revenue to support key public institutions; and

WHEREAS, DNR state trust lands are managed under a trust mandate that requires undivided loyalty to current and future generations of defined beneficiaries, rooted in both federal and state law, the Washington Constitution, and numerous federal and state court decisions, including the Washington Supreme Court's Skamania vs. Washington decision; and

WHEREAS, counties, local school districts, fire districts, ports, hospitals and other public entities rely on timber revenues from DNR's management of over 600,000 acres of state forest lands, which counties entrusted to the State of Washington to manage for their benefit after these once private lands reverted to public ownership following the Great Depression; and

WHEREAS, in Clallam County, the following junior taxing districts receive revenues generated by DNR State Trust Lands:

Port of Port Angeles.

WHEREAS, sustainable timber harvests from DNR state trust lands

generate over \$200 million annually for trust beneficiaries and agency management costs while also providing opportunities for public access and recreation; and

WHEREAS, timber harvests from DNR state trust lands create year-round employment in communities across the state, contributing to over 105,000 direct and indirect jobs and \$4.9 billion in wages generated by Washington's forest products industry, which is the second largest lumber producer in the nation; and

WHEREAS, wood products are a renewable, climate-friendly building material that store carbon and require less energy and emissions to produce than other alternatives, Washington state provides an ideal climate for sustainably growing forests and producing wood products under some of the strictest environmental standards in the world, and wood products not produced in Washington state will be imported from countries across the globe to meet domestic demand, including those countries with inferior environmental standards; and

WHEREAS, half of DNR state trust lands in western Washington are no longer available for sustainable timber harvests under policies adopted by the Board of Natural Resources and a Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) agreement with the federal government, which was promised to provide certainty and predictability for beneficiaries related to the management of the remaining lands available for harvest; and

WHEREAS, in 2019 the Board of Natural Resources approved an amendment to the HCP relating to Marbled Murrelet conservation, which set aside additional state trust lands from timber harvests but also released thousands of acres for harvest that had been withheld from management pending the adoption of the amendment after years of delay; and

WHEREAS, the annual sustainable harvest level set by DNR for state trust lands in western Washington decreased from 550 million board feet in 2005, to 465 million board feet in 2019, and is forecasted to drop further to 419 million board feet in 2025 due to the implementation of the HCP, murrelet amendment, the removal of lands from trust status, and other Board of Natural Resources policy decisions, which will result in reduced revenues for trust land beneficiaries, lost jobs in the forest products sector, and less wood products produced in the State of Washington; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Natural Resources and DNR are being pressured to permanently end timber harvests on some or all of the remaining state trust lands available for harvest -- including areas released for harvest under the murrelet amendment -- with no basis in law, policy, science, or consideration of the impacts to the environment or carbon emissions of importing wood products from across the globe; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Natural Resources oversees policy and trust management duties performed by DNR, includes representatives of the beneficiaries of state trust lands – including counties, universities, and K-12 public schools – as well as the Commissioner of Public Lands and a representative of the Governor, and can provide DNR guidance about the

importance of not further reducing sustainable timber harvests from state trust lands consistent with past promises of certainty and stability from the HCP and murrelet amendment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PORT OF PORT ANGELES COMMISSION:

Does hereby express its support for maintaining and increasing the DNR state trust lands available for timber harvests, beneficiary revenue generation, and the production of climate-friendly wood products, well-managed, healthy forests resilient to forest fire, disease, and climate change; is further resolved in its opposition to further voluntary removals of acres from management, which only further undermines the certainty and stability assured by DNR and the Board of Natural Resources under the HCP and murrelet amendment; and copies of this resolution be provided to the members of the Board of Natural Resources, the Governor of the State of Washington, the Clallam County Commission, and its delegates in the Washington State Legislature.
